Harold Brown

Born in 1909 in New York City, Harold Brown was a respected composer and an early influence on Ned Rorem. He became a pioneering teacher and conductor of Renaissance music and mentor to Noah Greenberg, founder of The New York Pro Musica Antiqua, the seminal early music ensemble.

This Centennial event

explores and celebrates Brown's compositions and Renaissance music editions, as well as the influence he had and the love he shared with his associates and students. On Saturday, October 31st at 3 pm, well known chamber and vocal artists will perform a selection of his compositions. On Sunday, November 1st the evening concert at 7:30 pm will re-create the then-unique programming he enjoyed bringing to New York from 1953 until his death in 1979
